



THE PUBLIC THEATER ANNOUNCES PARTNERSHIP WITH THE CITY UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK

Partnership includes Arts Administration Fellowships at
The Public and More, Made Possible with Generous Support from the
Diamonstein-Spielvogel Foundation and The Tow Foundation

October 23, 2023 – The Public Theater (Artistic Director, Oskar Eustis; Executive Director, Patrick Willingham) and The City University of New York (CUNY) announced today an expanded partnership, further strengthening both institutions' deep commitment to fostering the professional development of talented emerging artists and arts administrators. The partnership, which invests in nurturing generations of arts leaders whose presence will help diversify the field, is made possible with the generous support of the Diamonstein-Spielvogel Foundation and the Tow Foundation.

The partnership, which focuses specifically on Hunter and Brooklyn College's undergraduate theater training programs, includes a suite of activities aiming to build a robust workforce development program. **Karla De Leon**, **Jay Savana**, and **Madison Tamayo** have been chosen as 2023-24 season's Brooklyn College Carl and Barbaralee Diamonstein-Spielvogel and Tow Fellows. As part of their six-month paid fellowships, each fellow will be engrained within specific Public Theater departments in each student's chosen discipline, providing them with robust professional development and network building opportunities to help launch their careers, and offer resources to fellows to build a portfolio of work. MADISON TAMAYO began producing and directing at 17 when she started her a cappella group, "Sunday Serenade." She went on to direct, produce, and choreograph a production of *Be More Chill* for the Northport Theatre Troupe at 18. At Brooklyn College, she acted in plays such as *Antigone*, *The Motherf*cker with the Hat*, and *Everybody*. As a student, she also independently produced and directed a production of *Criminal Hearts* by Jane Martin. She also had the opportunity to assistant stage manage and understudy the debut production of *My Cousin Nelu Is Not Gay* for ANTfest at Ars Nova.

THE PUBLIC THEATER continues the work of its visionary founder Joe Papp as a civic institution engaging, both on-stage and off, with some of the most important ideas and social issues of today. Conceived over 60 years ago as one of the nation's first nonprofit theaters, The Public has long operated on the principles that theater is an essential cultural force and that art and culture belong to everyone. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Oskar Eustis and Executive Director Patrick Willingham, The Public's wide breadth of programming includes an annual season of new work at its landmark home at Astor Place, Free Shakespeare in the Park at The Delacorte Theater in Central Park, the Mobile Unit touring throughout New York City's five boroughs, Public Forum, Under the Radar, Public Lab, Public Works, Public Shakespeare Initiative, and Joe's Pub. Since premiering *HAIR* in 1967, The Public continues to create the canon of American Theater and is currently represented on Broadway by the Tony Award-winning musical *Hamilton* by Lin-Manuel Miranda. Their programs and productions can also be seen regionally across the country and around the world. The Public has received 60 Tony Awards, 190 Obie Awards, 57 Drama Desk Awards, 61 Lortel Awards, 36 Outer Critics Circle Awards, 13 New York Drama Critics' Circle Awards, 62 AUDELCO Awards, 6 Antonyo Awards, and 6 Pulitzer Prizes. publictheater.org
